# Western Lacrosse Association Report Paul Dal Monte, Commissioner

The Western Lacrosse Association had a great season with the resurgent Coquitlam Adanacs finishing the regular season in first place followed by the New Westminster Salmonbellies, Victoria Shamrocks, and Maple Ridge Burrards. The Salmonbellies came out on top, defeating the Adanacs in the WLA finals, earning the right to host the Mann Cup at historic Queens Park Arena.

Their opponent was the Six Nations Chiefs, whose star-studded roster was dominated by national team players. The series proved to be among the most exciting in recent memory, as it went to a seventh and deciding game in front of a sold-out crowd at Queen's Park Arena, with Six Nations coming out on top with a 12 - 7 win, capturing their third consecutive Mann Cup.

This year's Mann Cup was the most successful on record, with six sellouts and an average attendance of 3,300, and thousands more watching online.

Overall, WLA teams saw an increase in attendance, as well as increased traffic and engagement on league and team websites and social media.

The WLA draft of graduating junior players will be held Thursday January 29, 2026; this event will be streamed live.

Congratulations to all of those teams who won League, Provincial, and National Championships in 2025.

## **Thompson Okanagan Junior Lacrosse League -BT1**

This was the first season I acted as commissioner for the Thompson Okanagan Junior Lacrosse League (TOJLL). It was my first time as commissioner at any level in Senior Lacrosse and as such, it was a learning experience that was made easier by the support of the senior directorate, the previous league commissioner, and the league governors.

The 2025 season for the Thompson Okanagan Junior Lacrosse League (TOJLL) for the most part worked out as planned.

The Kamloops Venom could not defend their TOJLL championship in the playoffs. There was a new champion: The Kelowna Kodiaks. They went on to play The Coquitlam Adanacs in provincials. We congratulate the Coquitlam Adanacs for their Silver medal at the Founders Cup in Alberta.

The TOJLL 2024 season allowed for the expansion of our program to the Kootenays with the inclusion of the Cranbrook Black Wolves as a member of the TOJLL. There was also interest on the West Kootenays to enter TOJLL, and it seems that it will be an ongoing process that could potentially add one more team to our league in the future.

Though there are still distance challenges in regard to the location of the Cranbrook in the Kootenays, 1200KM round trip from the farthest TOJLL team. This was addressed by playing Saturday night and Sunday morning games both as the away team and the home team (same as last year). With a young team Cranbrook grew stronger throughout the season as more of their older players returned from school. The experience gained for their U17 players given the opportunity to play with the team will speak volumes for the quality of players that they have moving up.

Armstrong was unable again to field a team for the season. It is disappointing, however there is hope for the future. The corresponding minor association (Shuswap) is making a big push to come back, hopefully in a few years Armstrong might have a Jr team again.

With Armstrong unable to field a junior lacrosse team, Vernon had an oversized roster in which players were signed and unsigned throughout the season to get them playing time. This year again the minor commission received requests from Jr aged players to play down in minor. These requests are concerning as all of those requests were denied, and most likely those players will not play lacrosse due to the saturation in the Jr Program in that area.

Minor Lacrosse for the area is increasing, however for some minor associations last season their U17 numbers were lower than usual. However, the minor associations are showing signs of growth in the lower divisions which will hopefully provide support for the junior teams in the area. Smaller team sizes, such as South Okanagan and Cranbrook that utilize the development of the U17 players for their Minor teams appear to lead to stronger commitment at the junior levels from the players.

On the floor play was fast this year, with more emphasis on the game rather than the fighting, which was great to see. Less suspensions were issued than in the previous year, which surpassed my expectations! Lacrosse is a physical game with big legal hits, the players keeping it within the game play is great to see.

## Thompson Okanagan Junior Lacrosse League -BT1

A negative for the season is the continuous vilification of the officials happening in games. Individuals yelling constantly about calls that are perceived unfair/bad doesn't help at all. I attended several games at different arenas during the season and I observed that at all the locations. This vilification doesn't seem to get the attention it deserves and it is always dismissed as a non-issue by everybody. These are games where minor lacrosse players attend (as well as other minors that just want to know the game) and it is disappointing when minors also follow/imitate that disrespectful behaviour not only when they are at the Jr games, but also when they are in minor events (either as players or fans) where some officials are of the same age as them(or even younger). Yet, none of those individuals that are so unhappy and that are so loud about the officials' job have any proposals to improve the officiating. Officials are a scarce resource and their numbers are not getting any better. Losing one official at this level in our zone could have a huge impact on the league schedule and yet all games are played; no games (regular season and playoffs) were cancelled this season.

I, as any commissioner (or any member of the general public for that matter), do not have any authority over any official's allocation to games or their performance on the floor at all. Yet, there were several instances this season where fans on the stands would address me only to complain to me as if I was the one making the call on the floor, and at the same time demanding to get better officials.

All in all, I really enjoyed all the games I watched. The focus for the league's governors is to showcase the game of lacrosse to the public, and they are doing their best to do that with different degrees of success across the region.

#### **BCLOG Vice Chair Senior Report - 2025**

The Senior year started with the senior group going back to in-classroom certification for all Senior Officials. Full Senior clinics were held in; Victoria, Nanaimo, New Westminster and Kelowna. Modified Senior Clinics were held for Prince George and Cranbrook. An online clinic was held in late May to accommodate returning University students. New for this year was a Young Guns clinic.

I personally attended the 4 main Senior clinics and it was clearly demonstrated that this is the correct teaching method to reach out and touch base with our members.

The Young Guns Senior clinic was tested in 2025. This involved both the classroom portion plus the on-floor component followed by actual Senior games on the same day. Thanks to Nick Thomas for taking the lead in this new program.

The Senior Operations group will be discussing this new approach and may add another Young Guns clinic to the Island for 2026.

In regards to the Senior hybrid rules, the Senior Operations group went province-wide for the hybrid on-floor rules and floor positioning. The majority of Senior Leagues were already using these rules the past 2 seasons but this made it much easier for the Senior Officials working the various Senior Leagues.

The Women's Senior League officially came under the Senior Officials umbrella and the league had a successful year with us. The majority of their games was handled by a two-man Senior Officials crew. A few games required the use of minor officials. For for the Women's League next year, we will want to assign an OIC for their year end tournament.

Registration went fairly well with the Senior Officials paying directly to the BCLA Office. There was only a very small number that had to be reminded to submit their fees. This may change for 2026 as we get more involved in Ramp.

The assignments handled by Ashley and the Andersons went very well this year.

The main issue is the format that is in use - needing officials to make themselves available instead of forcing officials to block days off as in the past. This resulted in very poor communication between officials and assignors. This needs to change for 2026. Assignors spent way too much time trying to fill games. The other assigning issue is the Senior officials pool is also available to everyone in the Province and Minor Club assignors are giving games to the Senior Officials. This is not an issue Monday to Thursday. It's the hectic Senior weekend schedule from Friday to Sunday that presents a problem. On the Lower Mainland there are approximately 25 to 28 Senior games every weekend. Assigners need all Senior officials to be available. The only reason we made it through the Senior season without a lot of cancellations was due to a handful of Senior Officials that did double headers on Saturday and Sunday and were also available to go to any arena in the Lower Mainland or Island. You officials know who you are, thanks. There was only 4 games cancelled in Senior due to no Senior Officials available, 1 on the Island and 3 on the Lower Mainland. There was no cancellations for the Interior or North. Huge improvement over the previous 2 years.

The Senior group needs to add another 15 to 20 officials that will commit to officiating full time. We have the numbers currently but not the commitment.

Many Senior Officials are still playing or coaching.

Senior Provincials went very well across the Province. Jr B2 used the 3 man mechanics throughout all games in the tournament and this was such a positive experience that the Jr 2 B2 Provincial Committee has adopted the 3 man mechanics for all future Provincials. Thanks to Tyler Boyer and his group of officials, Vince Steigel, Adam Donald, Angie Reid, Benji Dos Santos, Jordan Kelly and Brent Rippberger.

The Jr B1 Provincials also went with the 3 man mechanics and also demonstrated this is the correct system moving forward. Excellent job by Braden Wilkins, Lisa Hibbeln and Kody George.

Sr C Provincials was held in Prince George with Cam Comeau being the OIC. Was a great tournament considering all officials were brought in from outside PG to make this work. Thanks to the North Sr C Commissioner Don Whittmeier for looking after all the accommodations and meals for the group. There was only 1 minor incident which resulted in the

tournament committee to get involved and overturn a semi final result. The positive out of this is it was recognized by the Sr C Provincial Committee that their own rules for running a Sr C Provincial needed to be updated for the immediate future.

Jr A final series was 3 man mechanics. This was also offered to Sr B for their final series but they declined.

I will be recommending to the Senior Directorate that future Senior Provincials be using the 3 man mechanics and Senior League final series be using it also.
